What is Itraconazole Capsule 100 mg?

Itraconazole Capsule 100 mg is used in the treatment of pulmonary fungal infections that can be spread throughout the body. It is also used in the treatment of fingernail fungus infections. Toenail fungal infections are treated with itraconazole tablets. Itraconazole liquid is used in the treatment of mouth, throat, and oesophagal yeast infections (the tube that connects the throat to the stomach). This medication belongs to the triazole class of antifungals. It acts by inhibiting the growth of infection-causing fungus.

How to use Itraconazole

- Itraconazole is available as a capsule, tablet, or liquid for oral use. The capsules are normally given after or right after a full meal if you're taking itraconazole for the treatment of fungal infections in the lungs take it after food 1 or 2 times a day for three months.
- If you're using itraconazole to treat a significant fungal infection in your lungs, the capsules should be taken 3 times a day with a meal for the first three days, then one or two times a day with food for at least three months.

- Itraconazole capsules are normally given once a day with a full meal for twelve weeks for the treatment of fungal infections of the toenails (with or without fingernail infections). If you're simply taking itraconazole for fungal infections of the fingernails, the capsules should be taken 2 times a day with food for one week, then skip for three weeks before being taken twice a day with food for another week.
- It should be swallowed as a whole, without being opened, chewed, or crushed.
- Itraconazole Capsule 100 mg capsules are digested in the body in a variety of ways and are used to treat a variety of ailments. Do not use the liquid in place of the capsules or the capsules in place of the liquid.
- If you're using itraconazole to cure nail infections, your nails won't appear any better until new ones come in.
- It can take up to six months to start growing fingernails and up to twelve months to build a new toenail, so don't expect to see results right away or for several months after your treatment. Even if you don't notice any improvement, keep taking itraconazole.

Precaution - Itraconazole Capsule 100 mg

If you have an allergy to itraconazole, other antifungal medications including

<u>ketoconazole</u>

- , or voriconazole, other medications, or any of the chemicals in itraconazole products, notify your doctor.
- Inform your doctor if you're taking or have taken any of the following medications in the last two weeks before starting itraconazole treatment: carbamazepine, efavirenz, isoniazid, rifabutin, rifampicin, nevirapine, phenobarbital, and phenytoin.
- Inform your doctor about any additional drugs, vitamins, nutraceuticals, or herbal products you're taking or planning to use. Your doctor will need to adjust your prescription dosages or keep a close eye on you for side effects.

- Take an antacid one hour before or two hours after consuming itraconazole if you're taking this.
- If you have or have had cystic fibrosis (breathing, digestive, or reproduction issues), any condition that reduces the quantity of acid in the stomach, or HIV, notify your doctor.
- If you have a pregnancy, planning to become pregnant, or breastfeeding, notify your doctor. If you are pregnant or may become pregnant, you should not use itraconazole to cure nail fungus.
- During your therapy and for two months afterwards, you need to use effective birth control. Call your doctor if you become pregnant during using itraconazole for any reason.
- You should be aware that Itraconazole Capsule 100 mg can induce dizziness, blurred vision, or double vision. Do not drive a vehicle or operate heavy machinery until you have a better understanding of how this drug affects you.

How it Works

itraconazole is a type of antifungal drug. It treats your skin infection by killing and stopping the fungus's growth by damaging its cell membrane.

Side Effects of Itraconazole

The majorities of side effects are minor and will go away as your body adapts to the medication. If they don't go away or you're concerned about them, see your doctor.

- Nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea, headaches, stomach distress, and dizziness are all possible side effects. Inform Tell your doctor immediately if any of these side effects persist or worsen.
- Remember that your doctor provided Itraconazole Capsule 100 mg because he or she believes the advantage to you exceeds the risk of adverse effects. The majority of people who take this medicine do not have any substantial adverse effects.
- If you experience any major side effects, such as numbness/tingling in your arms/legs, hearing loss, or mental/mood abnormalities, contact your doctor straight away.
- Itraconazole has caused liver damage in a small number of people. If you experience signs of liver disease, such as nausea/vomiting that won't stop, lack of appetite, stomach/abdominal discomfort, yellowing eyes/skin, or dark urine, call your doctor

immediately.

Tips for Using Itraconazole Capsule

Itraconazole is a fungicide that is used to treat fungal infections in the mouth, skin,

vaginal area, and other regions of the body.

Even if you feel better, do not miss any doses and complete the entire course of

treatment.

■ Take it with food and at the same time each day if possible.

■ While using Itraconazole Capsule 100 mg, use an effective contraceptive method to avoid

becoming pregnant.

Itraconazole should not be used within 2 hours of taking antacids for indigestion.

Your doctor may do a liver function test before you begin therapy and on a frequent basis

after that. If you observe yellowing of the eyes or skin, dark urine, or stomach pain, call

your doctor.

■ If you experience adverse reactions, nerve pain, or loss of hearing, contact your doctor

immediately.

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
